A Message from our Superintendent

As I look back through this past school year, I am very proud of the many accomplishments of our students and educators. Our students competed in national, regional, and state competitions and have worked to grow as productive learners in rigorous learning environments. Our Chariho Athletes have had outstanding athletic accomplishments. Our Theatre Company has absolutely excelled on the stage, and our chorus students in every school continue to shine.

We developed a new District Strategic plan and we are confident that the plan we have created will accelerate learning across all schools. We ran a Kindergarten Kick Start Program last August. We purchased high-quality curricula resources in mathematics and English Language Arts. We invested in professional learning opportunities for our educators around the Science of Reading and Mathematics Instruction. We built in time within our elementary and middle school schedules for additional academic support for students, and we increased tutoring opportunities across the district. The education and growth of our students are at the forefront of every decision.

Some of our elementary school highlights focus on our before-school opportunities in the District, such as Richmond's Reebok BOKS movement program and Math Squad, Hope Valley Elementary School's Maker Mornings, and Charlestown Elementary School's Running Club. We are also extremely proud that Heidi Gonzalez-Fee, a Charlestown Elementary School fourth-grade teacher, was selected as the RI State Finalist for the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching.

Our District showed over an 11% increase in mathematics on State Assessments and our focus on the Science of Reading has already provided us with data that shows incredible student growth in our classrooms.

Chariho High School's Advanced Placement (AP) exam performance was very strong in 2022, with the majority of AP subject areas outperforming both state and global data. Seventy-five percent of all Chariho AP students earned a score of 3 which means that a student has proven themselves capable of doing similar work in an introductory-level college course. The 2022 US News & World Report ranked Chariho High School 9th among all RI High Schools.

We are also excited about the number of grant opportunities we have received in the '22-23 School Year. Our District secured over two million dollars in grants. This allowed us to enhance student opportunities and learning spaces while not burdening our taxpayers. A great example was the opening of the Charger High School AMPhitheater. Thanks to a \$67,290 grant we received from the Champlin Foundation last year, the High School Band room was renovated to serve as a more flexible learning and performing space. Through the grant, new industrial flooring, a new sound system, riser seating, practice mirrors, and other classroom-related items were purchased to enhance this space. We also received over \$400,000 through RIDE grants to enhance our arts facilities and equipment as well as our science, engineering, mathematics equipment and educational spaces.

Guided by our Health and Wellness Subcommittee, students and educators have worked hard to increase student support services. We have begun partnering with the Chris Collins Foundation to train Peer Mentors at the middle school and high school to support their peers and to work on removing stigmas regarding mental health. Our students across the district participate in community events such as the annual food drive which collected over 6,000 cans of food. Our Hope Valley students earned the Harvest REAP Banner for their considerable food donations to our community.

The Opening Ceremony of the Maddie Potts Memorial Field House was a highlight for our entire community. The facility is a beautiful addition to our main campus. There is a two-story atrium, a home locker room, restrooms, a concession stand, and an athletic training room. The facility serves a wide variety of needs for athletes and visitors. While the facility is a wonderful addition, it also has special meaning for our community. We cannot thank the Potts Family and the Maddie Potts Foundation enough for gifting us this state-of-the-art facility.

Overall, as we close the 2022- 2023 School year, our Chariho pride continues to grow every year. We are excited for the 2023-2024 School year, as our District prepares to take action on [Vision 2026](#) to ensure we are accelerating learning and ensuring continuous improvement.

- Trained a cohort of Youth Mental Health First Aid trainers to deliver Youth Mental Health First Aid training to staff during SY '23-'24



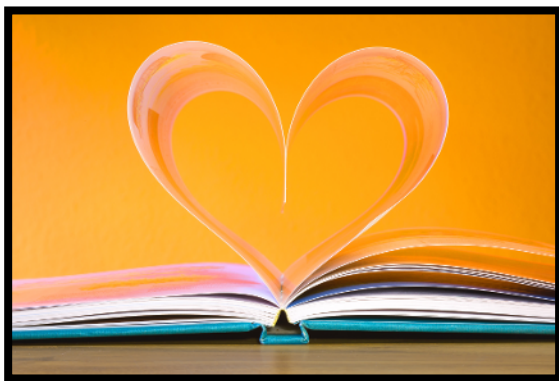

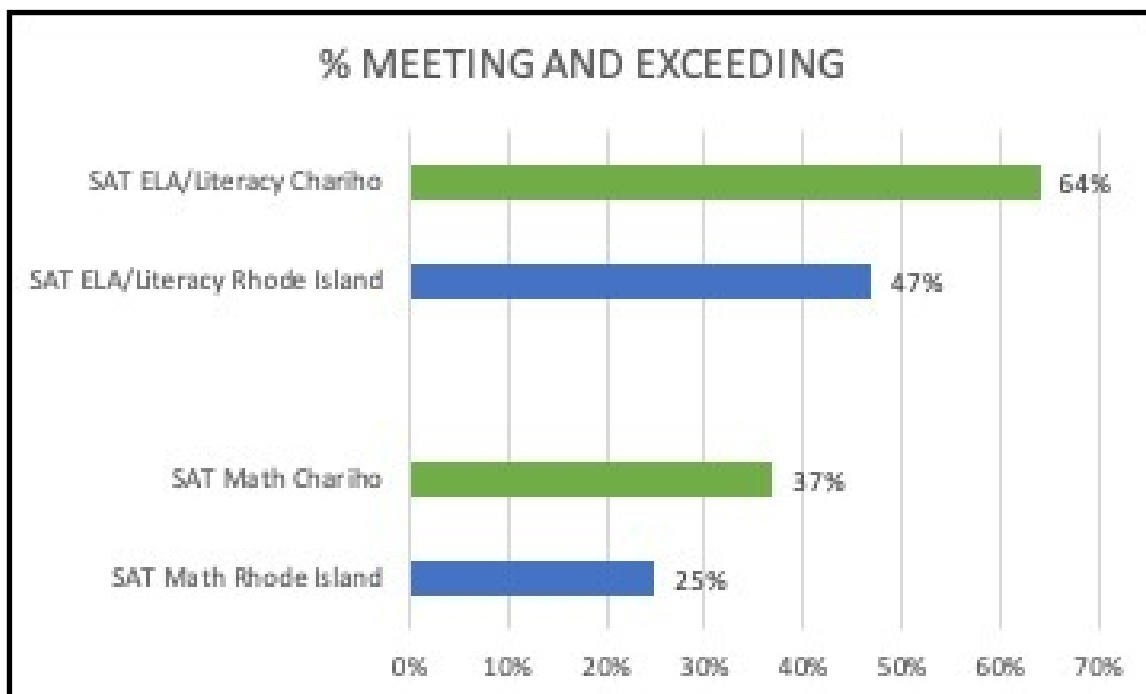


2021-22 PSAT/SAT Results

Chariho High School is proud to offer 25 Advanced Placement (AP)[®] courses, which is one of the highest numbers of offerings in any high school in the state. Our AP enrollment is open to all students who want to challenge themselves without the need for a teacher recommendation. A score of "3" or "Qualified" means that a student is capable of doing the work of an introductory college course in a particular subject.

Section 1111(h)(6)(B)(ii) of the Title I statute requires that schools provide timely notice that a parent's child in a participating Title I school has been assigned to, or taught for 4 or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who does not meet state qualifications and licensing criteria.

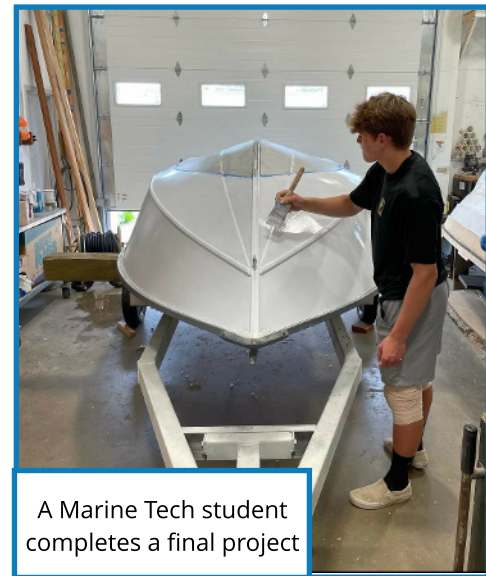

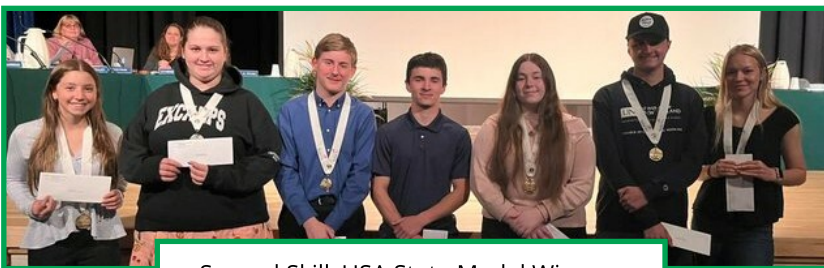

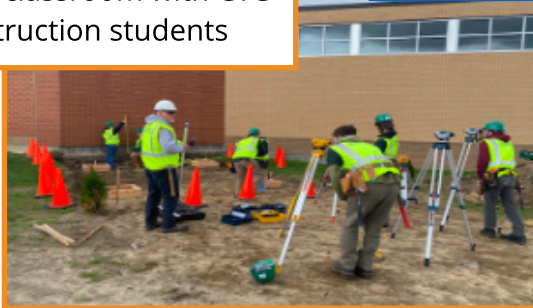

- Provides community-wide education opportunities including substance use education pages available on CharihoYouth.org

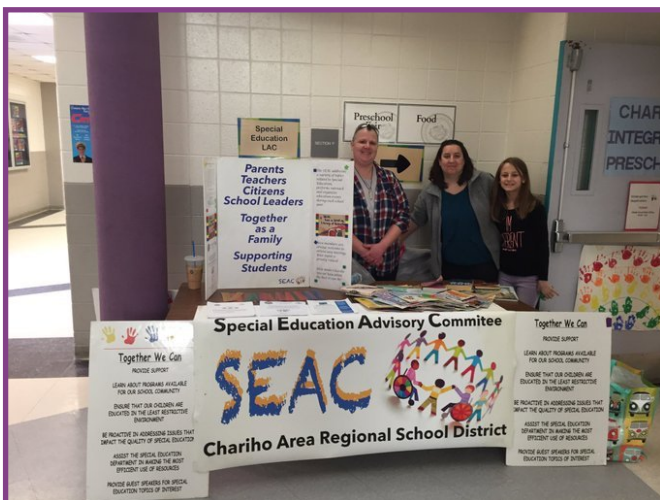

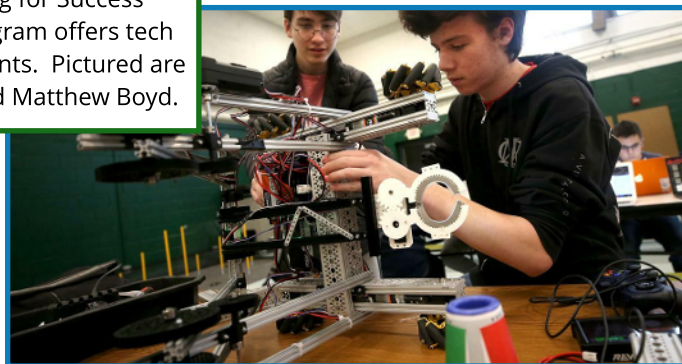

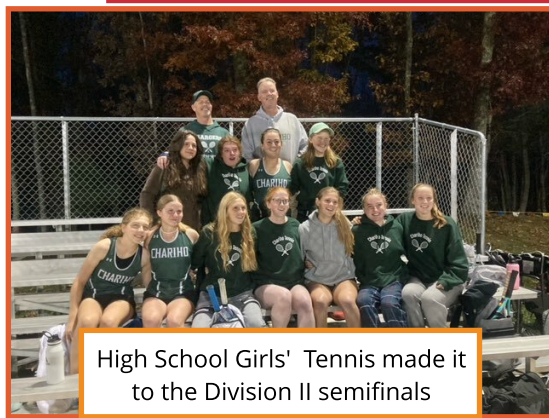

Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act (FERPA)

A federal law designed to protect the privacy of a student's education records, FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's educational records. These rights transfer to the student, or former student, who has reached the age of 18 or is attending any school beyond the high school level. Students and former students to whom the rights have transferred are called eligible students. Parents or eligible students have the right to inspect and review all of the student's education records maintained by the school. Parents and eligible students have the right to request that a school correct records believed to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student then has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record commenting on the contested information in the record.

Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student before releasing any information from a student's record. However, the law allows schools to disclose records, without consent, to the following parties:

1. School officials who have a need to know;
2. Other schools to which a student is transferring;
3. Certain government officials in order to carry out lawful functions;
4. Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
5. Organizations conducting certain studies for the school;
6. Accrediting organizations;
7. Individuals who have obtained court orders or subpoenas;
8. Persons who need to know in cases of health and safety emergencies;
9. State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific state law; and
10. Another school in which a student enrolls.

Parents have the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the Chariho Regional School District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

Schools may also disclose, without consent, directory type information such as a student's name, address, email address, telephone number, honors and awards, date and place of birth, height and weight of athletes, grade level, photographs, participation in officially-recognized activities and sports, and dates of attendance. However, schools must tell parents and eligible students about directory information and allow parents and eligible students a reasonable amount of time to request that the school not disclose directory information about them. If you wish to opt out from the disclosure of directory information, please complete the form at the bottom of the next page and return it to your child's school by the end of September or within one week from date of new student registration.

Chariho Middle School receives Title I funds. Under the Act, parents of children attending the Middle School may request the professional qualifications of their child's teacher(s). Parents may request information related to state certification and licensing criteria, emergency certification, and degrees held as well as information about the qualifications of paraprofessionals. This information is available by calling the Superintendent's office at 364-7575. Section 1111(h)(6)(B)(ii) of the Title I statute requires that schools provide timely notice that a parent's child in a participating Title I school has been assigned to, or taught for 4 or more consecutive weeks, by a teacher who does not meet state qualifications and licensing criteria.

Notification of Rights Under the Protection of Pupil Rights (PPRA) Amendment

PPRA affords parents, students who are 18, or emancipated minors ("eligible students") certain rights regarding our conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams. These include the right to:

Consent before students are required to submit to a survey that concerns one or more of the following protected areas ("protected information survey") if the survey is funded in whole or in part by a program of the U.S. Department of Education (ED) -

1. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent;
2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
3. Sex behavior or attitudes;
4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
7. Income, other than as required by law, to determine program eligibility.

Receive notice and an opportunity to opt a student out of -

1. Any other protected information survey, regardless of funding;
2. Any non-emergency, invasive physical exam or screening required as a condition of attendance, administered by the school or its agent, and not necessary to protect the immediate health and safety of a student, except for hearing, vision, or scoliosis screenings, or any physical exam or screening permitted or required under state law; and
3. Activities involving collection, disclosure, or use of personal information obtained from students for marketing or to sell or otherwise distribute the information to others.

Inspect, upon request and before administration or use -

1. Surveys of students;
2. Instruments used to collect personal information from students for any of the above marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes; and
3. Instructional material used as part of the educational curriculum.

The School District has developed a policy, in consultation with parents, regarding these rights, and has made arrangements to protect student privacy in the administration of protected information surveys and the collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes. The School District will directly notify parents and eligible students of this policy at least annually at the start of each school year and after any substantive changes are made. Parents of students who believe their rights under PPRA may have been violated may file a complaint with ED by writing the Family Policy Compliance Office. Complaints must contain specific allegations of fact giving reasonable cause to believe that a violation of PPRA occurred.

School Offender Registration and Community Notification Act

At the beginning of each school year, the Chariho Regional School District is required, under Rhode Island's Sexual Offender Registration and Community Notification Act (R.I. Gen. Laws § 11-37.1-1 et seq.), and in compliance with guidelines issued by the Department of the Attorney General, to submit to local law enforcement agencies a directory of the names and addresses of parents who have children attending schools in Chariho.

The Rhode Island Sexual Offender Registration and Community Notification Act requires certain offenders to be registered with law enforcement agencies and, in certain instances, requires local law enforcement agencies to provide notification to the community.

The Rhode Island Attorney General's Department has issued guidelines for the procedures to be utilized in connection with community notification. Under the Attorney General's guidelines, the Chariho Regional School District is required to submit a directory listing of the names and addresses of parents whose children attend school in the district. In keeping with Chariho's responsibilities under the law and the Attorney General's guidelines, Chariho will be submitting a directory listing of all parents who have children attending schools in Chariho to the local law enforcement authorities.

In the event that a local police department determines that it is appropriate to provide community notification to the parents of children attending school, this directory will be utilized; and you may receive offender fact sheets from the law enforcement agency unless and until you notify Chariho that you wish your name(s) to be removed from the directory or until you no longer have children attending school within the district, whichever comes first.

Below is a form which you may utilize if you choose to opt-out from the disclosure of directory information. If it is your preference not to be listed in the directory, please complete the form, indicating the name(s) of your child or children, your address, and affix your signature(s). Please return the form to your child's school by the end of September or within one week from date of new student registration. Information will be included in the directory unless we receive this form, signed by you.
